Mein Wine

Stupid Is As Stupid Drinks

The (London) *Daily Mail* reported this week that a tourist from Philadelphia whose relatives died in Auschwitz was shocked to find wine bottles in an Italian supermarket featuring Adolf Hitler, *ym"sh*, on the labels.

One wine was called "Mein Kampf"; and another: "Ein volk, ein Reich, ein Fuhrer."

An inquiry has been opened into the sale of the wine bottles, which have apparently been available for a number of years, and, according to the producer, sell very well.

Prosecutor Mario Giulio Schinaia told news agency ANSA that "the only crime that could be currently attributable to this is that of 'apologizing for fascism'," a legal offense in Italy.

"At this point, though," he added, "it would be opportune to invent the crime of human stupidity."

Creative Ad-Crafters Mix Film and Philosophy

In other Hitler news, the Huffington Post reported this week about a fake ad, produced as a project by German film students for a competition sponsored in part by Mercedes-Benz. It featured a Mercedes C-Class automobile but in a striking way, raising a chilling historical "what if?"

Anachronistically, the vehicle winds through a 19th century Austrian town, and its collision-prevention feature helps it avoid hitting two girls playing in the road. But the car then speeds toward a little boy flying a kite and runs him down. The boy's mother screams "Adolf!" and a split-second image of a scowling adult Hitler flashes across the screen.

And then the tagline appears, referring to the car's technology: "Detects dangers before they come up."

The final shot is of the boy's lifeless body on the grass, twisted into a swastika.

Buoyant Bennett Bombs

The Jerusalem Post reported on Israeli
Minister of Jerusalem and Diaspora
Affairs Naftali Bennett's call to Reform
and Conservative Jews to visit the
Western Wall during the High Holy Days
and pray at the newly upgraded site that
has been prepared by the government for
non-Orthodox services.

Earlier this week, Mr. Bennett cheerfully announced that the Robinson's Arch area, just south of the main Western Wall Plaza, had undergone a substantial upgrade. The new prayer platform there covers approximately 450 square meters and can accommodate approximately 450 worshippers. Torah scrolls, prayer books and prayer shawls will be made available at the site, which will be accessible seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

The Robinson's Arch site was designated a prayer area for non-Orthodox services in 1998, and a small prayer platform was constructed there in 2004.

Bennett said that, despite criticism by the feminist group Women of the Wall, the Robinson's Arch area is on equal historical and religious footing with the rest of the plaza.

Approximately 20 women, including the leaders of the Women of the Wall, participated in a 24-hour sit-in (and sleepin) at the Western Wall to protest the government's unwillingness to change religious standards at the main Western Wall plaza, where Jews have prayed in a traditional fashion since 1967 (and, whenever they could, for centuries before).

Mr. Bennett's presentation of the new prayer area did not receive a warm welcome.

Asked for comment by *Haaretz*, an Agudath Israel spokesperson said: "The balkanization of the Kotel Maaravi is a step away from, not toward, Jewish unity. For more than three decades, the Kotel has been a place – perhaps the only one in the world – where Jews of all affiliations and persuasions have regularly prayed side by side."

"What has allowed for that minor miracle," I added, "has been the maintenance of a standard at the holy site that all Jews – even those who might prefer other standards, or none at all –

can abide."

For her part, Woment of the Wall's chairman, Anat Hoffman, unequivocally rejected the new site, calling it a "sunbathing deck."

"There's no G-d over here,"
Ms. Hoffman complained,
according to the Jewish
Press. "G-d is around the
corner, where the
charedim are davening."

Madman On The Loose In Moscow

The European Jewish Press this week highlighted some interesting statements made by Moscow mayoral candidate

Alexei Navalny, the self-described "defender of Russian democracy."
In a party celebrating the anniversary of the newspaper *The New Times*, the 37-year-old Russian blogger, who was

sentenced to five years in prison on embezzlement and fraud charges but is free pending a ruling on his appeal, suggested that those gathered "make the first toast for the Holocaust." And on his blog, he referred to religious Jews as "dandies in fox hats and rags."

Jews, however, "are not the only ethnic minority on the... candidate's mind," the report notes.

"In a video distributed in Moscow, he identifies dark-

skinned Caucasians as cockroaches and states that 'though one can kill cockroaches with a shoe, when it comes to human beings, I recommend a gun'."

Zalman Zaklas, the

Novosibirsk donated
the land.

"The center, which has 37,000 square feet of floor space, has a synagogue,

classrooms, a kosher restaurant and Jewish shops, as well as a computer corner, entertainment area and gym."
